First, thanks for the cards and gifts for our wedding anniversary and Christmas. Thank you for your prayers, intentions, for healing. Please hold her in your prayers, and send healing energy for both the surgery and recovery.

We have entered into this new calendar year during heart of winter. So many folks set new intentions at the beginning of a new year. I read somewhere recently that this may be incongruous with the season of winter. Winter is nature's time to rest and rejuvenate after harvest and before spring. Many animals hibernate or have migrated. Others are surviving on stored resources. Plants are waiting for the return of spring. I think there is some wisdom in sharing nature's rhythm. You might consider spending a bit more time in meditation, prayer, reading, doing some art work, whatever practices that assist you in being reflective. This is time for being more than doing.





**Habitat for Humanity**  
**Students Building a Neighborhood**

This year, students from East, Guilford, and Jefferson High Schools completed three Habitat homes, marking an important milestone: thirty homes now stand in the Holiday Drive neighborhood. What was once empty land has transformed into a vibrant community where families can grow and thrive.

Executive Director Keri Asevedo reflects on the transformation: “Now when I drive through, I recognize families and children playing. This is a community that love built.”

Students participating in the construction learned every aspect of building a home, from framing and drywall to electrical wiring and finishes. As Malachi Cannon of East High School shared, “We really built this from the ground up. It’s super fulfilling.” Christopher Brown of Guilford High School added, “I can fix things at home now because of what I learned here.” Each home is tailored to the needs of the families who will live there, providing a foundation for lasting stability.



### **Faith Community Nurse Notes**

ELCA (Evangelical Lutheran Church in America) New Year's resolutions focus on spiritual growth, connecting with God's word, serving others, and living out faith in daily life, moving beyond typical self-improvement goals to deeper transformation, emphasizing hope in God's molding power rather than just willpower for personal change. Common themes include reading Scripture, prayer, generosity, acts of mercy (like helping neighbors), and finding God in everyday blessings (Luther's "daily bread").

#### ***Spiritual & Faith-Based Resolutions***

- **Deepen Faith:** Take time for God's Word, meditate on Scripture, or pray for others.
- **Worship:** Commit to worship or find new ways to connect with the sacred.
- **Serve:** Perform corporal works of mercy, help neighbors, or practice generosity.
- **Live Out Vocation:** See daily tasks and blessings (work, family, health) as opportunities for faith, a concept Luther called "daily bread".

#### ***Practical & Life-Oriented Resolutions***

- **Be Present:** Live in the moment and appreciate life's sweet and bitter experiences as God shapes you.
- **Connect:** Spend more time with family and friends.
- **Learn:** Develop new skills or learn something new.
- **Stewardship:** Manage finances better, reflecting Luther's broader view of daily bread.

## ***The ELCA Perspective***

- **Transformation, Not Perfection:** Resolutions are viewed as part of God's ongoing work of molding and renewing you, not just relying on personal will.
- **Hope in God:** Ultimately, hope rests in God, who fulfills promises, rather than solely in human effort.

## ***How to Approach Them (Inspired by ELCA themes)***

- **Start Small:** Pick one or two achievable goals, like a daily prayer reminder.
- **Connect to Scripture:** Use Bible verses about new beginnings or transformation as inspiration.
- **Be Merciful:** Look for opportunities to be kind and generous to strangers and loved ones.
